
- Everybody has a smart phone with internet access on their belt, in their purse or in their pocket.

- It is no longer necessary to physically travel (and be somewhere at a specific time) to have access to information.



### New Researchers are Different

- Research is being done whenever time is available.
- Their focus is on information that is available on-line.
- They have many sources of information to choose from.
- In many cases, interest stems from receiving DNA test results.
- They would benefit from learning basic methodologies.
  - But they may not know what they don't know...

### Needs of Experienced Researchers Have Changed

- They have also shifted much of their focus to on-line resources.
- They may plan physical visits to archives of interest to their specific needs and interests.
- Their need for training/education are probably focused on more specific topics:
  - They no longer need to learn basic research methodology

### Societies Need to Adapt and Evolve

We need to understand how people interact with the world today.

- The "Field of Dreams" approach (*"If you build it, they will come"*) is not working any more.
- We need to provide something researchers want.
  - Beginners
  - Experienced Researchers
- We need to appear to be an organization that people want to become involved in.

### "Constituent" vs. "Member"

**Constituent**: a part of a whole, a member of a group, or a component of a system (<u>https://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/constituent</u>)

This can be:

- Someone who visits your website or your Facebook page
- Anybody who participates in one of your meetings
- Someone who wants to learn how to research their family history
- An experienced researcher seeking help with their research
- Someone who is willing to become more involved by contributing their time (or money) to your society.

### The Challenge

Reinvent/reorient your society to provide activities, events and information that will attract members constituents

- Who will be motivated to become volunteers
- That you can groom to become leaders.

- Skills Development Genealogy, leadership, management and/or technical skills.
- **Networking** Making advantageous connections with others

# Become knowledge experts about what is available and how to access it.

- Identify record sets, training and resources relevant to your society's areas of interest.
  - Focus on what can be accessed at no cost.
  - But be knowledgeable about what is available from fee-based sources.
- Have opinions, recommendations and expertise about the strengths and weaknesses of the fee based services.
- Have opinions, recommendations and expertise about genealogy software products.

### Can your society respond to questions like these?

- I'm just beginning... can you help me get started?
- What software should I use to create my family tree?
- If I'm going to subscribe to a commercial service, which one should I choose and why?
- How do I begin researching in [Some Location]?
- I have multiple trees... how do I keep them all up to date?
- Should I do DNA testing?
- Which DNA company should use?
- Should I test with more than one company?
- How do I interpret my DNA results?

### Help Your Constituents Learn New Skills

- Know the relevant training materials that are available from the Big Players.
- Provide presentations on topics of interest to your constituents
  - Hint: Ask them!
- Don't forget about beginners
  - They probably are not (yet) constituents of your society.
  - Market/cater to them.
- Don't forget about your more experiences researchers either!

## Dallas Genealogical Society's Experience

- · 2018
  - Our General Meetings attracted a total of 272 participants (all inperson).
- · 2023
  - Our General Meetings attracted a total of 190 in-person participants.
  - We had an additional 1,435 participants who attended remotely and/or watched a recording of the meeting.
  - 1,625 in total.
    - A 497% increase in participation over 2018.


